# A Rich Rail Heritage!

Railroads have operated in the Santa Maria Valley since the 1800's. The Pacific Coast Railway that connected San Luis Bay to Santa Maria, built a network of electric lines extending east to Gary Ranch, west to Guadalupe and Betteravia, as well as operating a trolley route to Guadalupe.

By 1911 the Santa Maria Valley Railroad was extended from the Betteravia area to Roadamite in the hills near Sisquoc where an oil refinery was located.

In 1925 oilman and real estate developer Allan Hancock bought the Santa Maria Valley Railroad along with the oilfields at Roadamite and ranch land in the eastern portion of the valley.



### **Exhibits**

The **Santa Maria Valley Railway Historical Museum** founded as a non-profit, educational museum, is dedicated to the preservation of the railroad heritage of California, the Central Coast, and the Santa Maria Valley.

The museum has acquired *Historic Caboose Number 180*, After repair and preservation it has become the museum's premier exhibit.
